Never forget

Elephants are such beautiful animals, so it is extremely sad that they are becoming endangered. At gSc we work with the Elephant Conservation Network to provide villagers with alternative employment, instead of growing sugar cane. Farming sugar cane is a hard process; the villagers have to travel long distances and work long hours preparing the land, sowing the seeds and harvesting the crop. But elephants love the taste of sugar and, as the area of jungle decreases, they seek to raid cane fields. This results in human/elephant conflict. gSc provides a different means of income for these

We've created a manufacturing hub in Thailand where villagers can work. It took us two years to forge relationships and train them to standards of gSc's optimum quality. We now see the rewards of our time and effort invested; the villagers can make the jewellery to an extremely high standard and can work in the gSc studio, close to their homes, even whilst looking after children.
